Did you know that Westminster is one of several member churches of the NCP Congo Partnership, which has a fourteen year history of working to build hope, strengthen relationships, and empower the people and sister congregations in Kananga, Democratic Republic of Congo?

Congolese people experience widespread poverty, but their land is rich in natural resources. They flee tribal warfare and suffer oppressive government, but are bound in deep-rooted faith and share unbound hospitality.

If you are interested to learn how these partnership churches are sharing their experiences, hopes, dreams, and fears and are supporting one another in Christ across distance, time zones, and cultures, please come join us to hear of our successes and struggles.

Kairos Prison Ministry

Learn about three programs that spread the Good News to those in prison: Kairos Inside is a 3.5 day program taken into the institution that, through a step by step program, (re)introduces participants to the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ. Kairos Torch is a more intensive program for incarcerated offenders (25 and younger) in which each participant receives an individual mentor who works with mentees weekly for 6 months. Kairos Outside is a 2.5 day program for female relatives of those who are or have been incarcerated.



Dead Sea Scrolls

Thursday, September 20, 7:00 – 9:00 pm Rodney Chapel

Presenter: Alan Fox, Ph.D., Professor of Asian and Comparative Philosophy and Religion at the University of Delaware

The Dead Sea Scrolls (also known as the Qumran Caves Scrolls) are ancient Jewish manuscripts written mostly in Hebrew, which were found in the Qumran Caves near the Dead Sea. The texts have great historical, religious, and linguistic significance because they include the second-oldest surviving manuscripts of works that were later included in the Hebrew Bible canon, as well as deuterocanonical and extra-biblical manuscripts that preserve evidence of the diversity of religious thought in late Second Temple Judaism.
