

Reform(ed)(ing): A Reformation Celebration

The youth of Westminster are excited to share an interactive worship experience in celebration of the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's nailing the 95 Theses to the door of the Wittenberg Cathedral. Luther's actions led to the tenuous and divisive conversations that paved the way for reformers like John Calvin and other fathers of Presbyterianism.

What I love most about history is the way we can see ourselves in its stories. Throughout my research around The Reformation, I often wondered: Did Luther understand what nailing his thoughts about the Roman Catholic Church on the door would mean? (Apparently, in his day, the door was a common space for announcements... like a bulletin board...or an early form of social media!) Is our culture *now* any more open to difficult conversations around reform?

Through this presentation with our youth, I wanted to explore how the spirit and ideals of a tumultuous time in God's church can and does inform our faith community now. We watch Luther (and some fictional by-standers) work through the implications of some radical ideas. They do so under three (of many) reformation themes—*Sola Fide* (By Faith Alone), *Sola Scriptura* (By Scripture Alone), and the *Priesthood of All Believers*. Three different actors play Luther to represent this last (and I believe, *key*) concept to The Reformation—that we have direct access to God without a human mediator, regardless of our monk's robe or priestly collar. Luther's one-hit-wonder “A Mighty Fortress” is weaved throughout the action, often played in groups of three musicians.

Luther was famous for his self-flagellation—that is, he always struggled with a sense of failure. He was known to have been heard screaming from his study (supposedly in response to this darkness), “I am BAPTIZED! I am BAPTIZED!” Imagine being so sure of your identity in Christ to use those words so confidently! What an incredible opportunity it’s been to explore these topics with our youth—an age group wrestling with questions of identity. By the end, we were all in agreement with the Martin Luther of the play: the fact that we are justified through *faith* instead of *works*—“Golly... that’s GOOD NEWS!”

I hope you enjoy the fruits of our labor and will join me in celebrating our denomination’s call to be “Reformed and Always Reforming According to the Word of God!” Thank you to the entire staff of WPC for their support, especially Rev. Sudie Niesen Thompson, as well as Executive Presbyter, Rev. Jim Moseley, who assisted in the building of the set pieces.
